The home's use as an apartment house for more than 70 years came at a high price. Rooms were divided, ceilings were lowered, and some of the unique architectural enhancements were damaged or removed. By the mid-1970s, its future looked bleak.

WHEN YOU VISIT

Kirkman House Museum is located just three blocks from Main Street at 214 North Colville. It is within easy walking distance from many downtown hotels, motels, wine shops and restaurants. On-street parking is plentiful, and the museum is easy to find.

Volunteer docents are available for guided tours of the house and to describe the engaging life of the Kirkmans and early Walla Walla. Guests are also free to explore the house and grounds on their own. Guided tours are usually one-hour long, provide much more information than self-guided tours and are available at no cost beyond the admission fee.

The museum has something for everyone. History buffs, lovers of fine architecture and those with curious minds all find Kirkman House fascinating. It's also very popular with children and young adults. This is a museum you and your entire family will enjoy.

The New Woman: Fashion from 1910 to 1929

The early 20th century was a period of gradual yet profound change for American women. In 1920, after decades of struggle, women secured the right to vote. This era also witnessed a broadening of career options for women, as traditional barriers began to erode.

Eashion served as a vivid reflection of these societal changes, with women's clothing evolving dramatically in response to the era's newfound freedoms and opportunities.

Women embraced flapper dresses, with their dropped waists and rising hemlines. The iconic cloche hats and bobbed haircuts further symbolized this break from tradition. Through their sartorial choices, women of this era boldly asserted their newfound role in a rapidly changing world.

WHITMAN TIES

Friday, August 23 to Sunday, November 17, 2024

The Kirkmans and Whitman College

In a significant act of philanthropy, Isabella Kirkman bequeathed her home to Whitman College in 1919, reinforcing her family's enduring commitment to the institution. This gesture aligned with Whitman's drive to amass funds for a new dormitory on campus, subsequently named Lyman Hall.

From 1920 until 1924, the former Kirkman residence served as a dormitory for male students, one of whom was Walter Brattain. Class of 1924. Brattain was one of three physicists awarded the 1956 Nobel Prize for Physics for research on semiconductors and the discovery of the transistor effect,

This exhibit illuminates the story of Kirkman Hall and other surprising connections between Whitman College and the Kirkman family.

ADAM WEST

Kirkman House Museum is excited to present Adam West as we celebrate the life of the TV hero and the hometown boy Bill Anderson.

Journey with us as we learn the history and background of the man who would become Batman. The son of a farmer-father and an entertainer-mother, Bill attended Green Park Elementary, Walla Walla High School and Lakeside in Seattle. He returned to the valley in 1946 to attend Whitman College.

Explore Bill's path after Whitman to his early days in Hollywood when he adopted the name Adam West and won the role that would define his career. See replicas of Batman's famous cowl, the red Bat Phone, and Shakespeare's bust.

This interactive exhibit places you in Bruce Wayne's den where you can receive a call from Commissioner Gordon on the screen accurate Bat Phone and then try to figure out how to reveal the Bat Poles. View clips from Adam's career on the Bat Viewer, styled after the Bat Computers in the Bat Cave. Discover the



pride that Walla Wallans feel for their own superhero through personal photos, articles and memorabilia.

Adam West's Batman, the role for which he is known around the world, was a unique spin on a classic character. From Batman's early days in the comics of old to the modern blockbusters that have come to define a new generation of hero, the history of the character and the man will be connected in the hearts and minds of fans forever.

Our thanks to Jonathan Grant for donating many of the items for the exhibit. As manager of the Marcus Whitman Hotel, Jonathan became friends with Adam West when West stayed at the hotel during his visits to Walla Walla. Adam passed away in 2017. Since his death, Adam West Days have been celebrated in Walla Walla each September near his birthday.

FORT WALLA WALLA

Fort Walla Walla Museum is a must-see for visitors to Walla Walla. With four large exhibit halls housing thousands of artifacts, a pioneer village, a 33-mule team hitched to a wooden combine, and a rotating special exhibit, there's always something new at the old fort.

Our 17-structure outdoor Pioneer Village includes a one-room schoolhouse, train depot, doctor's office, and two pioneer cabins. Visit our website for a full schedule of events-free monthly after-hours presentations, Living History performances from April through October, heritage skills demonstrations/ workshops, Ice Cream Social, and Antique Truck Show.

FRENCHTOWN

The scenic **Frenchtown Historic Site** overlooks the location of a mid-19th-century settlement of approximately fifty French-Canadian and Métis families. Points of interest include the St. Rose of Lima cemetery and the 1837 "Prince's Cabin." The site is free and open to the public.

Interpretive signage provides family histories and burial records as well as information on the Oregon trail, the fur trade, and interactions between local tribes and settlers. Amenities include walking trails, a bike rack, a vault toilet, and handicap parking.

Maintenance and development of the site is made possible by contributions to the Frenchtown Historical Foundation, as well as the volunteer efforts of descendants and members of the community.

SMITH HOLLOW

Open Saturdays from April to October (or by appointment), the Blue Mountain Heritage Society hosts two free exhibits in Dayton, Washington, at 113 North Front Street.

The Smith Hollow Country Schoolhouse, built in 1900. offers hands-on activities.

Visit the **Dodge 1898 Quarantine Cabin** built to house a quarantined son returning from the Spanish-American War

The **Palus Museum** is at 426 East Main Street. Its collection of locally found Indian Artifacts offers a glimpse of the region's past.

Also at the Palus is the Columbia County Veterans Display with items from the Civil War, WWI, WWII, and more. A life-size bronze Sacajawea Statue by Carol Grande stands on the corner of First Street and Commercial Street.

DAYTON DEPOT

Originally built in 1881, the **Dayton Historic Depot** is the oldest surviving passenger train station in Washington State. The Depot is now a beautifully restored museum: exhibits are the ticket office, the passengers' waiting room, the stationmaster's living quarters, and the freight room with the original freight scale still in working condition.

Dayton's **Boldman House** remains much the same as it was in 1912 and is one of Dayton's significant examples of the Queen Anne style. The house and its contents form an extraordinary time capsule that gives a unique and detailed history of the Boldman family and how they lived and interacted with the community and the changing times.

The two museums serve as cultural hubs, offering exhibits, educational tours, and special events that celebrate the region's rich heritage. Admission is free,
